Campus Security Act In 1990, President Bush signed into law the "Student Right to Know and Campus Security Act." This act requires all postsecondary institutions to prepare, publish and distribute certain information regarding campus crimes and

policies relating to security. The University of South Florida is a comprehensive research university with campuses in four locations includ-

Security of Campus Facilities/ Residence Halls

The University of South Florida is a public institution and, with the exception of residence halls, is open to the public during the day and evening hours when classes are in session. After these hours, University buildings are generally locked and only faculty, staff and some students with proper identification are admitted. University Police provide regular patrol of University buildings as well as parking lots.

Resident students are issued a key at checkin so they may have access to their living unit. Students are encouraged to safeguard keys in order to enhance their personal safety and the safety of others. An effective residence hall security system program depends upon resident cooperation, staff supervision and University Police assistance. The best security system is one in which every member of the community takes personal responsibility for self-protection and the protection of their property.


University Police (UP) officers regularly patrol the residence halls and are readily available to assist on

The crimes reported on each chart are separated by crimes reported directly to USF Police Department in Tampa and crimes reported by University Officials or by other local law enforcement agencies in Tampa. The locations are identified as: on-campus, either in the residential area (Res) or other areas of the campus (Othr); non-campus buildings or property, which are the buildings owned or controlled by the University or a student organization recognized by the University and used by students but not in the geographic area of the campus; public property, which is property contiguous to the University.

R.A.D.: Basic Physical Defense

What is R.A.D.? The Rape Aggression Defense System is a program of realistic self-defense tactics and techniques. It is a comprehensive course for women that begins with awareness, prevention, risk reduction and avoidance while progressing to the basics of hands-on defense training. *R.A.D. is not a martial arts program.* Members of the University Police Department are currently teaching the RAD System of Physical Defense at the University of South Florida.

The RAD System is dedicated to teaching women defensive concepts and techniques against various types of assault by utilizing easy, effective and proven self-defense tactics. Our system of realistic defense

AGGRESSION R

The Aggression Resource Network is a team of professionals at the University of South Florida whose purpose is prevention and minimizing aggression. Recognizing early warning signs is critical. Educational programs and services are available through the program.

Community leaders have a responsibility to assist our citizens in times of crisis. The Aggression Resource Network takes a proactive approach in addressing potentially disruptive or violent behavior occurring in the university setting. It is a one-stop resource for getting timely assistance when needed in these situations. Should you feel the need for assistance with a disruptive or threatening interpersonal situation, you may contact any of the network members. The goal of the Network is to offer an immediate response to your needs to facilitate a smooth transition back to normal academic or business functions. The SAFE Team is an on-campus escort program that provides members of the USF community a safer option for getting to their car or residence hall after class or heading to or from the library to study. SAFE Team patrols the campus at night and provides assistance to students in a variety of ways. SAFE Team's first priority is to reduce students' risk when they are most vulnerable—while walking by themselves or waiting for someone to pick them up. The SAFE Team (in one of their golf carts) can provide a safe escort for these students. In addition, as SAFE Team patrols the campus, their presence deters criminals from having an opportunity to commit a crime without being observed.
