**Current State of Theory and Research on the
Physical Environment in Small Area Crime Studies**

Abstract: There has been substantial recent attention to sub-city level units of analysis in crime research, such as street segments, hot spots, and census-based units such as blocks, block groups, and census tracts. The long term goal is to identify a comprehensive set of predictors, which can serve as a resource for theory and research in small area crime studies.
